Dear Native Hawaiian Organization Leader:

The U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) invites you to consult on the development of the DOI Scientific Integrity Policy. Pursuant to President Biden's [Memorandum on Restoring Trust in Government Through Scientific Integrity and Evidence-Based Policymaking | The White House](#), the National Science & Technology Council (NSTC) has created new policies and procedures pertaining to scientific integrity for the whole of the Federal Government. Those new policies in turn call for each federal agency to develop its own scientific integrity policy.

As DOI prepares its own policy, we seek to engage with you to hear your concerns and understand what you would like to see included in the policy. To facilitate our consultation, enclosed are some questions for your consideration.
