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## MAGNESIUM METAL IN THE THIRD QUARTER 2022

All forms of magnesium metal imports for consumption in the third quarter of 2022 were 26,800 metric tons (t), 30% more than the revised imports in the second quarter of 2022, 125% more than those in the second quarter of 2021, and 99% more than those in the third quarter of 2020 (table 1).

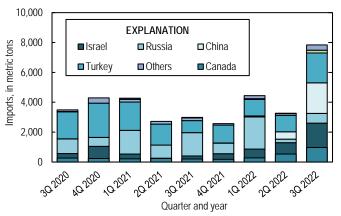


Figure 1. Quarterly imports of magnesium metal from the third quarter of 2020 through the third quarter of 2022. Source: U.S. Census Bureau, adjusted by USGS.

Compared with the imports in the second quarter of 2022, imports of metal, alloys, and semifabricated products increased by 130%, 20%, and 40%, respectively. In the third quarter of 2022, magnesium metal accounted for 33% of the imports, with Israel (41%), China (32%), and Turkey (31%) being the leading sources (fig. 1). Scrap accounted for 30% of the imports in the second quarter of 2022, with Canada (23%), China (16%), Mexico (13%), Czechia (12%), and India (11%) as the leading sources. Alloys accounted for 32% of the imports, with Czechia (33%), the Republic of Korea (15%), Israel (10%), and Canada (9%) as the leading sources (table 1).

Total magnesium metal exports in the third quarter of 2022 were 53% less than exports in the second quarter of 2022, 49% less than those in the third quarter of 2021, and 77% less than those in the third quarter of 2020. Exports of metal, alloys, semifabricated products, and scrap decreased by 79%, 6%, 51%,

and 61%, respectively, compared with exports in the second quarter of 2022 (table 1).

Canada (20%), Montenegro (19%), and Mexico (11%) were the leading destinations for magnesium exports in the third quarter of 2022. Canada received 8% of metal, 33% of alloys, 11% of semifabricated product, and 25% of scrap exports. Mexico received 56% of alloy exports. Thailand and China received 21% and 15%, respectively, of semifabricated product exports. Montenegro and The Netherlands received 43% and 18%, respectively, of scrap exports.

The U.S. spot dealer import and the U.S. spot Western price average prices for magnesium were unchanged in the third quarter of 2022. In Europe, the average price was slightly less at the end of the quarter compared with that of the beginning of the quarter (table 2).

#### **Update**

Magnesium imports from China during the third quarter of 2022 were 2,040 t compared with 488 t in the second quarter of 2022 (figure 1). Prior to the second quarter of 2022, imports of primary magnesium metal from China rarely have exceeded 10 t in any quarter since antidumping duties were imposed in 1994, which currently is at a rate of 111.74% ad valorem. Concerns about deliveries from US Magnesium LLC's smelter in Rowley, UT, have been cited for increased imports since it declared force majeure on September 29, 2021. The 63,500-metric-ton-peryear smelter experienced an equipment failure and some customers stated that they were forced to obtain magnesium from other sources. US Magnesium did not disclose how much capacity was affected by the situation and has not provided updates about the progress of repairs (Jonson, 2022).
